She had a quiet life when Richard Beddall owned her, but had a busy working life with the last two owners, and now in semi-retirement with me.

The last owner, Paul Ridley, is a farmer and used her for work around the farm.



When owned by Alec Gatherer, she was often seen towing a trailer full of Riley spares, and even a complete Riley at times. Alec is a keen Riley fan and a member of a Riley RM Club.



We collected 635 on Saturday 16th from Paul Ridley in central Wales, which is among beautiful countryside. We came away with some wonderful homemade apple juice. We, being me, my wife, Haddow our son and Willow the dog

When Haddow first saw 635, he loved her very much and was somewhat relentless and insistant about our making the purchase. He did a 'reasons to buy' chart, a poem and finally a petition, which even my boss signed.

As we had gone all that way from Devon, we decided to make a weekend of it, overnighting in Rhayader, and with the 270 miles back to Devon she ran like a dream. We name all our cars, so 635 is now known as Thomas.

There is a lot of work to do but she has so many original features. She will be our show car this year and we can't wait to show her to our friends in the club, even the rusty bits!! The first outing will be at the Land Rover Legends show at Bicester Heritage, Oxfordshire, where she will be on the Project Jay Preservation Group stand alongside seven other Jays (the 200 shape D1).



We now have a launch V8, G490WAC, and a non-launch 200 Tdi, G635WAC, and I have said to Haddow, that's it, dad is now skint!

G510 WAC

I remember the 1989 Discovery launch clearly and how, at the time, what a seismic event it was even as a callow 18 year old! The 90 and 110 Land Rover had been around forever (not yet christened Defender – it would be the Discovery's introduction that precipitated that name); we all understood the role of the Range Rover too – the luxury flagship. So what was this interloper...?



Initially I wasn't convinced. Boxy, the slightly awkward styling that to me always resembled an oversized Talbot Matra Rancho. Funny how things grow on you. I remember the contemporary reports of the press launch in Land Rover Owner magazine, and even then appreciated the symmetry of the G-WAC registration series.

As an 18 year old however, this was a lifestyle aspiration out of reach. I bought my first car (a Series One!) in November of that year and since then three RR Classics, five more Series Ones, a Defender, a Discovery 3 and a Range Rover Sport (also a press car!) have come and gone.



By 2016 there was an itch I had to scratch. An early, three-door D1 was needed. No expert, I bought L708 BPH, a Pennine Grey 200 Tdi that was showing its age but had a sequence of diligent owners. It proved to be a reliable and capable car for just shy of £1500 on eBay. A house move forced a reluctant sale – not before she'd carried the family from York to Oban and back one holiday. Still miss that car.

Then, in November 2017, a sniff on Facebook brought a well-known Corallin Red 1989 example my way - G67 RYJ. A mere 46k miles from new and never welded, it was a thing of beauty. I had to have it. Only problem was – it was *too* good. With a young family and a dog, I feared for its unmarked condition.

By now I'd decided that a G-WAC was the target. If I bought the right car it could be usable and worthwhile. The decision to sell RYJ was hastened by the opportunity to acquire G510 WAC from Mark Dixon, Octane magazine deputy editor. He'd owned it before and could vouch for its generally sound condition, so a deal was done.

510 is Arken Grey and one of two G-WACs in this colour that survive (the other is a V8). After a couple of false starts, 510 is now with Mark Harrow down in Devon for a body-off restoration. Mark is well known in the D1 fraternity and I have found him exceptionally helpful to deal with. Progress so far, the chassis has been galvanised and refinished with parts assembled for the body rebuild.



I know a few Project Jay Preservation Group folk from my involvement with the CVC register (I must join properly!) and I am eagerly anticipating the 30th Birthday Party event down in Plymouth, where I look forward to helping to properly mark the 30th anniversary of a car that – surely – must have exceeded any expectations Land Rover had of it back in 1989 and is now a brand in its own right.

Part numbers FTC2600 and 2601 are listed by Paddocks and other suppliers, but they are not the true wide shield that was fitted to the early Jays with GA chassis numbers. The parts appear to be no longer available.

I picked up a couple of used ones at a show last year, but now almost impossible to source.







They are not difficult to make. Some flat sheet and a 55mm wide band rolled to shape by your friendly steel suppliers. A bit of welding and there you go.
